climate-resilient reefs. Alannah's advocacy has been featured on PBS Nova, Discovery Channel's Shark Week, the "Enslaved" documentary, and in *Essence* magazine. She leverages a 27K-strong social media following and sponsorships from GoPro, PADI, and SUUNTO to bring ocean science to diverse audiences. An active member of Black in Marine Science and an accomplished free diver, she partners with underwater photographers to create imagery that highlights ocean conservation.

Professor Richard Thompson



Richard is a Professor of Marine Biology and Director of the University of Plymouth, Marine Institute. He is a world expert on plastic pollution. In 2004, he published the first paper describing the accumulation of microscopic fragments of plastic in the environment, naming them 'microplastics'. His team have been at the forefront of research describing the distribution and impacts of plastic debris in the environment. This pioneering work pivotal recognition microplastic in of contamination in policy, such as Marine Strategy Framework Directive. Increasingly his work focuses on evaluating the efficacy of solutions to this global

environmental challenge. Richard was awarded am OBE for services to Marine Science in 2018 and his team were awarded the Queens Anniversary Prize for their pioneering work on microplastics in 2020. He was elected as a Fellow of the Royal Society in 2021.

Dr. Renis Auma Ojwala is a Post-doctoral Research Associate at the World Maritime University (WMU), specializing in seafarer sustainability and gender equality in ocean science. With a diverse academic background, she is dedicated to advancing gender equality in maritime and aquatic sciences, as well as in addressing climate change. She contributed to several projects at WMU, including the Deep Dives Ocean-ICU, Project, the and "Empowering Women for the United Nations Decade of Ocean Science for Sustainable Development" (2019-2023). Currently, she is part of the pool of experts contributing to the Third World

Ocean Assessment report, co-chair of the Diversity, Equity and Inclusion (DEI) task team under ECOPs (Early Career Ocean Professionals), and a member of the (informal) UNESCO-Gender Expert Working Group. Dr. Ojwala holds a PhD in Maritime Affairs from WMU, a Master's in Limnology and Wetland Management from BOKU University Austria, Egerton University in Kenya, and UNESCO-IHE Delft in the Netherlands, and a Bachelor's in Applied Aquatic Science from Egerton University
